Scholarship Highlight

CCFMM Scholarship Fund Honors Rod Luplow

Crisp fall Friday nights. Stadium lights illuminating grass fields. Gleaming goalposts, screaming fans, marching bands! All this brings to mind the excitement of the high school football season. We remember our favorite games—the ones we won, the ones we lost, the ones we tied. We also remember special coaches and players. One such player remembered by many is Rod Luplow.

Luplow was a football standout at former St. Andrew's (first 2 years) and St. Stephen's High Schools, where he earned 3 varsity letters and was awarded first team all-state football honors his senior year, 1971. He was recruited by Eastern Michigan University to play offensive guard on the Huron football team. Luplow went on to become a co-captain of the team in 1975 and was named the winner of the Elton J. Rynearson award as the top scholar athlete on the 1975 EMU football team.

Weighing in at around 250 pounds and standing 6 feet tall, Luplow was a powerhouse. According to Saginaw attorney, Greg Meter, Rod's close friend and St. Stephen's teammate, "Rod and I would work out Monday through Friday every week, each summer, from late April to early August, in preparation for our upcoming college football seasons; Rod at Eastern Michigan and myself at the University of Dayton."

Then tragedy struck during the fall of Rod's junior year at EMU. According to Meter, "A routine X-ray revealed Rod had Hodgkin's disease, which required surgery and intensive chemotherapy and cobalt treatment." Luplow dropped 50 pounds and lost his speed and endurance. However, he fought back. He pushed himself, never gave up, and inspired all those around him.

Despite the setback, Luplow returned to play his junior and senior years as a starter and co-captain of the Huron football team. After graduation from EMU, Luplow became a teacher and coach. He later moved to Florida and became a successful businessman, selling insurance. He married and had 2 sons.

In 1988, significant scaring from the Hodgkins treatment required Rod to undergo surgery. According to Meter, Rod, always a fighter, was up and walking after the procedure. Yet, a blood clot formed, and when Rod went to sleep that night, he would never awake. Meter still feels the deep loss of his former friend, teammate, and one of the best people he has ever known. He adds,

"One of the many memories I have about Rod was that, despite the challenges he faced, he never complained or felt sorry for himself. What I watched him go through has impacted my life since."

Those who knew and loved Rod wanted to keep alive the memory of this champion on and off the field, and so the Rod Luplow Scholarship was established. Meter says they sold chicken dinners out of the Expressway Bar each summer to raise most of the funds for the Luplow Scholarship, which has been awarded to a Nouvel Catholic Central (NCC) senior/seniors each year since the early 1990s.



Fr. Bill Taylor Endowment for Lay Ministry





Father William (Bill) Taylor was able to transform peoples' lives through his love of Scripture.

He instructed more than 800 candidates in the Diocese of Saginaw's Lay Ministry Formation Program from its beginning 42 years ago. His classes brought the Bible to life.

"He was a teacher that the lay ministers embraced," said Kellie Deming, coordinator of lay ministry for the Diocese of Saginaw." He had the ability to make each of them feel they had a personal relationship with Jesus Christ."

Fr. Taylor, 80, died July 13 after serving the diocese as a priest for 53 years. During the vigil ceremony preceding his funeral, Fr. Steve Gavit acknowledged Fr. Taylor as the "best Scripture scholar in the history of the Saginaw Diocese."

Fr. Taylor conducted classes perched on his favorite high - top stool using maps to pinpoint the locations of significant events in the Bible. "He loved to share the good news of the gospels and remained the most popular teacher in the Lay Ministry Formation Program throughout the years," Deming added.

Pam Daily, lay minister at Blessed Trinity parish in Frankenmuth, appreciated his deep and vast knowledge of the Old Testament as well as his dry sense of humor. "What a loss for our diocese. He was a treasure," she said.

Fr. Taylor was born June 16, 1940 in Saginaw to Richard and Eileen Taylor. He was an only child and his priestly journey began early. A childhood friend

wrote on the memory page of his funeral notice that he made his first vestments out of his mother's sheets and colored them with crayons. "He gave every pet in the neighborhood that passed away a proper funeral," the friend wrote.

He graduated from St. Andrew High School. Then he earned an associate degree from Jordan Seminary in Menominee, MI; a bachelor's degree from St. Mary Seminary in Baltimore, MD; and a Master's of Divinity degree from St. John Provincial Seminary in Plymouth, MI.

He was ordained in 1967 at the Cathedral of Mary of the Assumption in Saginaw. His pastoral assignments included Our Lady of Lake Huron, Harbor Beach; Holy Spirit, Shields; Ss. Peter and Paul, Saginaw; St. Michael, Wilmot; St. Joseph, Mayville; St. Christopher, Bridgeport; St. Maria Goretti, Bay City; Blessed Trinity, Frankenmuth and Holy Family, Saginaw.

In addition to his pastoral ministry, he was a member of the Clergy Personal Board for 30 years. He also offered scripture seminars and conducted retreats, logging many miles to parishes throughout the diocese.

Parishioners he served remember him as wise, generous, witty, wholesome, holy, meticulous and a man who strictly followed tradition and routine. Some even adopted him into their families. Carol and Kevin Maurer, of Frankenmuth, met Fr. Taylor in 1986. "He soon became part of our family, celebrating holidays and birthday dinners. We even named our youngest son Ethan Taylor after him," Carol said. "His homilies really helped us grow spiritually."


He mentored seminarians including Fr. Andy Booms, homilist at Fr. Taylor's funeral. "He was like a father, keeping an eye on the younger priests in a very positive way," Fr. Booms said. "He had a wonderful sense of humor, care, concern and wisdom, never judging or condemning. He had his views but he never made them the litmus test or took joy in condeming those who disagreed."

Fr. Taylor retired in 2007 and served as a senior priest in residence at St. Dominic Parish in Saginaw. He continued teaching. His impact remained strong. "Because of his love of Scripture, he was able to build relationships necessary to form true disciples of Christ," Deming said.
