

Grant Recipient Feeds Body & Soul: How The Market Cultivates Community

The Catholic Community Foundation is committed to supporting the social needs of our community. The organizations awarded grants each year not only provide a service for those in need, but also create more inclusive, equitable communities throughout Mid-Michigan.

For Ken and Christine Neitzke, directors of a local non-profit called The Market, cultivating community has always been a priority. When Ken and Christine rejoined Nativity Lutheran Church in St. Charles in 2020, they asked themselves how they could connect with their community during a global pandemic.

What started as a community garden behind their church turned into The Market: a no cost, no judgment food pantry based in St. Charles. When The Market first opened in 2021, it was designed to be what Christine calls your “neighborhood corner store” in the giant pole barn behind Nativity Lutheran Church. In their first month, The Market served 85 guests. Today, four “mini markets” are located in St. Charles, Marion Springs, Oakley, and Saginaw. In 2024, The Market served over 18,500 people and distributed one million pounds of food. Ken says they’re on track to surpass that in 2025.

This year, the Catholic Community Foundation awarded more than \$150,000 in grants—including \$7,000 awarded to The Market from the Foundation’s Grant for the Poor and Needy. Like any food pantry, The Market sometimes struggles to generate consistent funding. “It’s human nature to worry,” says Ken. “But trust God. He’s always provided.” Christine and Ken have stories of how The Market has gone from having no food to having overflowing shelves in a matter of days. “When we put faith in God,” says Ken, “our shelves are stuffed again.”

“The Catholic Church has been our most steady supporter since we started,” says Christine. That connection is thanks to one of The Market’s board members, Mary Beth Smith, who found the grant application from the Catholic Community Foundation and applied. With \$7,000, that money will go directly to purchasing food. According to the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan, \$1 produces 6 meals. That means \$7,000 provides 42,000 meals!

To distribute that much food every year, The Market relies on a network of loyal volunteers and local churches. After buying a weekly truckload of food from the Food Bank of Eastern Michigan, volunteers unload the truck at Nativity Lutheran Church and divide it evenly between the four locations. When each of The Market locations opens for a day each week, guests are free to select the food of their choice. For Ken and Christine, their no cost, no judgment approach is what honors the human dignity of each of their guests. “You just come,” Christine says. “Come when you need food.”

The Market isn’t a distinctly religious organization, but it is a place where Ken and Christine show the love of Christ to others. It’s a place that, above all else, fosters community.

“Sometimes people ask us ‘Why do you do this?’ or ‘What’s your angle?’” says Christine. “When they realize there is no angle, it opens the door for us to talk about the love of Christ.” Ken says his favorite part about working with the volunteers is how they’ve created a community that supports one another regardless of faith. “It’s churches working together,” Ken says. “It’s not just one church.”

“The Market is just not a typical pantry,” Christine continues. From letting guests choose from a selection of food, to collecting gifts for the Christmas season, Ken and Christine want The Market to truly be a place where all are welcome. Ken and Christine know their volunteers and many of their guests by name as well as their families. Some volunteers even have a habit of saying, “We’re going to ‘the church’ instead of ‘The Market,’” Christine says with amusement. “The Market is like the community church.”

For Ken and Christine, building that sense of community is the most impactful part of The Market. Christine acknowledges that sometimes charitable organizations can feel like they’re being taken advantage of—especially with The Market’s no cost, no judgment approach. To that, Christine simply says The Market is about planting seeds that help people recognize the Church as a safe space. “God’s not putting you in charge of judging whether they deserve it,” Christine says. “He’s just telling you to feed them and love them. When you take the idea of ‘being taken advantage of’ off your plate, it becomes a lot more fun.”

And it is clear that Christine and Ken lead their organization with joy. Considering the incredible impact The Market makes each week, Christine and Ken are quite humble about their role as directors. That’s even more surprising considering that The Market won the 2024 Food Bank of Eastern Michigan Partner Leadership Award—bestowed on organizations that take innovative approaches to distribute more food to more people. Out of 22 counties and 600 agencies in the Eastern Michigan region, The Market was just one of two organizations awarded this honor. The Catholic Community Foundation is proud to award grants to organizations just like The Market—those that address the immediate needs of our community not just with humility, but also with joy. As Christine says, “It’s so fun when you watch God do things that are so outrageously cool you could never take credit for it.”

As for the future of The Market, Ken and Christine often say that “God has so much more planned for The Market than we even dreamed.” Looking forward, they’re searching for steady streams of funding and more avenues to increase their advertising to serve as many people as possible. In fact, The Market has already caught the interest of more churches wanting to host their own “mini market” locations.

However, above all, Ken and Christine value fostering personal relationships with their guests. “Personally, we feel we get so much more reward than we hand out,” says Ken. “This is our blessing,” says Christine. “These people are our blessing.”



As I come to the end of my tenure as President of the Catholic Community Foundation, I am deeply grateful for this special opportunity. Over the past two years, I am proud of the progress we have made together in advancing our mission to generously support the spiritual, educational, and social needs of our Catholic community.

I want to express my gratitude to the Foundation Staff and Board for their incredible support as we have worked to transform and grow the Catholic Community Foundation. When I began serving as President in December 2023, the Catholic Community Foundation's assets under management totaled \$38 million. With just two employees, we managed 221 endowments including 61 grants.

At the end of our third quarter in September 2025, our assets under management totaled \$45 million. We now have four full-time employees and 234 endowments, which includes 62 grants and scholarships. Together, our staff and board work to promote the Catholic Community Foundation in our own communities and strive to build relationships throughout the entire Diocese of Saginaw.

As 2025 comes to a close, I want to thank our donors, Catholic school educators, and parishioners who continue to make our communities places where we can all flourish. Gift Giving

Giving in the spirit of stewardship can be a deeply rewarding experience, simply because you are directly addressing a need in our community. But, making a donation can also be financially rewarding. If you are 73 or older, making a Qualified Charitable Distribution can fulfill a Required Minimum Distribution from your retirement accounts. In other words, giving to others can also be a gift to yourself!

If you're age 73 or older, you are required to take a specific amount out of your retirement accounts each year, often called a Required Minimum Distribution. However, when you turn 70½, you can already make a Qualified Charitable Distribution from your IRA to a qualifying 501(c)(3) organization. A Qualified Charitable Distribution allows you to make a direct donation to a qualified organization from your IRA, while the organization of your choice receives the full value of your gift, tax-free.

But, why should you give to the Catholic Community Foundation? That's because when you make a donation, you give *through* us, not to us. With our socially-responsible investment policies and our commitment to supporting the long-term needs of our community, the Catholic Community Foundation is here to serve our community members, donors, and Catholic parishes and schools.

Even if you're not 70½ or older, making a donation to the Catholic Community Foundation is an opportunity to give to the cause of your choice. Whatever cause or fund best supports your philanthropic intent, the Catholic Community Foundation can be your trusted advisor to steward your gifts.
