# June Grants and Designated Distributions



Every year the Catholic Community Foundation of Mid-Michigan distributes funds from designated endowments to Catholic schools, parishes and Catholic organizations throughout the Diocese of Saginaw. This year the CCFMM distributed over \$450,000. Below is the summary of these distributions.

Catholic Agencies received \$6,172 from *two endowments*.

Catholic International Organizations received \$4,406 from *two endowments*.

Catholic Organizations received \$8,112 from *one endowment*.

Catholic Parishes received \$92,601 from *twenty-five endowments*.

Catholic Schools received \$262,598 from *sixty-three endowments*.

Religious Education Programs received \$76,730 from *twenty-one endowments*.

# James Cardinal Hickey Endowment Fund close

This is a story about a Cardinal's commitment to his Catholic school in Midland and the support of the parishioners of St. Brigid of Kildare Parish to carry on his legacy as the school celebrates its 100th anniversary.

Members of St. Brigid's have raised more than \$900,000 for the James Cardinal Hickey Endowment Fund to make sure that St. Brigid School's operations are supported in perpetuity. The goal is \$1 million.



“The campaign is a perfect opportunity to acknowledge the legacy of Cardinal Hickey and do everything we can to preserve it for the future,” said Father Andy Booms, pastor of St. Brigid’s. “Cardinal Hickey was always proud of his heritage growing up in Midland. His life is a great inspiration to never lose hope and faith in Jesus because he raises leaders in all times of the church.”

Cardinal Hickey, referred to by some as St. Brigid’s “Golden Child,” attended grade school at St. Brigid, was ordained in 1946 and became the Auxiliary Bishop of the Saginaw Diocese in 1967. He served as Bishop of Cleveland and was elevated to Archbishop of Washington, D.C. in 1980, and then to Cardinal by Pope John Paul II in 1988. He died in 2004.

Cardinal Hickey himself established the endowment with \$50,000 seed money in 1991 and the fund grew to

\$1 million. In 2010, school trustees decided to use the majority of it to help fund a \$3 million school expansion that added a middle school, gymnasium, kitchen, and remodeled the original building.

*“We had outgrown the grade school building and needed the expansion to keep the school vital,” Father Andy said. “Our goal now is to restore the endowment for the future.”*

Father Andy explained that the leaders were able to draw down the money in the original endowment because the fund was managed privately and there were no restrictions. As of 2011, the endowment has been managed by the Catholic Community Foundation of Mid-Michigan (CCFMM) and only the interest is available on an annual basis.

The current campaign was launched with a sizable gift from the estate of parishioner and school alumnus Therese Nowak. Interest from the endowment will be used exclusively for the school including recruitment, training, programs, improvements and operations.

Another goal of the drive is to have 400 contributors. “Truly we want this to be the work of everyone, not just a few elites,” Father Andy said.

# Endowment Fund will provide an annual

Tom Erickson, co-chair of the Endowment Committee and a nephew of Cardinal Hickey, said St. Brigid's future is important because it is the only Catholic school that remains in Midland County.

*"More than ever today we need Catholic values and Catholic schools," he said.*

*"They produce strong future citizens."*

Committee member Maureen Becker, who taught at St. Brigid's for 18 years and was principal for 12 more, said the campaign is essential. "As principal I had the experience of working with very small budgets," she said. "To know that there will be a dedicated amount for the school each year is huge."

Becker said she is pleased with the progress of the campaign considering the turbulent economy. "I am seeing parishioners making sacrifices," she said. "I think people are finally becoming aware of how important this endowment is to the future of our Catholic school."

St. Brigid School had 135 students K-8 during the past school year. Enrollment is projected between 140 to 150 for the coming school year.

Father Andy is encouraged by the campaign. "The Endowment is a wonderful expression of trust and a way to sustain the life of our school, which is a vital part of our parish mission. We are making a final push to complete the journey."

# Stewardship: Giving from the Heart



We introduced the four areas of stewardship in our 2021 newsletters and thus far we have elaborated on being Disciples as Stewards, being Stewards of Creation, and being Stewards of the Church. In this issue of *Feeding Our Faith* we introduce the last area of stewardship, being Stewards of Vocation.

## What is a Vocation?

A vocation is the calling we have in this life. God has created us to love and serve Him, and He has a unique plan for each person's life - a vocation. As God is the source of all lasting happiness, satisfaction and joy, then living according to God's plan for us will be the best life we can lead. Courage, obedience and persistent prayer are needed for us to live our vocation, whether it is to single life, to marriage or in service to the Church as a priest or religious.

## What does it mean to be a Steward of Vocation?

Jesus calls us, as his disciples, to a new way of life—the Christian way of life—of which stewardship is part. But Jesus does not call us as nameless people in a faceless crowd. He calls us individually, by name. Each one of us—clergy, religious, lay person; married, single; adult, child—has a personal vocation. God intends each one of us to play a unique role in carrying out the divine plan. The challenge, then, is to understand our role—our vocation—and to respond generously to this call from God. Christian vocation entails the practice of stewardship. In addition, Christ calls each of us to be stewards of our personal vocations, which we receive from God.

## How do I discern my vocation?

*Pray* | Establish a routine prayer life of attending Mass regularly, praying the Rosary, meditating on Scripture, journaling, making a retreat, and spending time with the Lord in front of the Blessed Sacrament.

*Talk* | Contact your Diocesan Vocations Director and speak to them about your discernment thus far to get their advice on next steps.

*Spiritual Direction* | Spiritual Direction, often by a priest or consecrated person, attunes the heart to the voice of the Lord and will help you identify how the Holy Spirit is moving in your life.

*Come and See* | Often coordinated by the diocesan vocation office, these “Come & See” events offer a glimpse into the life of a seminarian / religious sister and will help you identify if this is the life to which God is calling you.

*Get Involved* | Consider volunteering in your parish or community and finding trusted friends who can provide support and accountability for your discernment journey.

*Rest* | Discerning a vocation should not be considered an “accomplishment” that you check off your to do list. It’s a daily walking with God that involves the whole person. A healthy life balance of eating well, exercising, and getting the proper amount of rest will positively contribute to your spiritual well-being.
